Legally Wedded Any two people 18 or older can get married in Vermont and licenses (\$80 and valid for 60 days) can be obtained from any town clerk in the state by providing your names, addresses, dates, and places of birth (and birth certificates as proof), as well as both of your parents' names (including mothers' maiden names) and places of birth. If widowed or divorced, you'll need to provide documented proof. Vermont also allows almost anyone to become a temporary officiant for a \$100 fee.
